



to his mother and father.


"I will be all right in the city.


I will find work. I will find a job."

A rose!


And right under his nose!

And his eyes began to itch.






"Go away!" the milk man told Robert.

You will have to do


everything you are told."




So Robert went to work.

When he was told to go fast, he went fast.




Robert did everything he was told.

But all at once . . .




"Look!" the woman said.

I want those roses.


Robert, take me over there at once."

Robert had to look for work again.


He looked and looked.

Fathers had work.


Mothers had work.

Every one had some kind of work.

















When Robert came out he was a police horse.

Robert saw a rose!


It was not a big rose.

A big, big sniff!


And he began to get that old funny feeling.

His farm friends came.


The doctor came.

"Robert," he said, "I have something for you."








"ROSES!" yelled the doctor.
